Isn't the same true for us? Have you ever sat at the back of a faculty meeting – where the naysayers are? Before you know it, your feelings may begin to drop and your own doubts and negativity begin to rise. When we focus on the negative – it seems to multiply and can be all-consuming. But, don't forget about those quick, little hummingbirds. They focus on beauty – and they find it. Their work is still difficult, but



Drug Trends and Our Students: Know What's Out There!

Vicky Ward, Prevention Manager at Tri-County Mental Health in Kansas City was the speaker for our Spring NWMSCA meeting. If you missed this event, you missed out on some crucial and frightening information. Some main points Vicky covered were as follows:

- Kids are driven by three main factors to experiment or use drugs perception of risk/harm, perception of availability, and perception of acceptability.
- Kids have alarming access to many drugs, such as alcohol-infused whipped cream/ice cream, over-the-counter products like energy/downer drinks, medications, even lazy cakes (relaxation brownies).
- Kids also have alarming access to prescription drugs. Many parents are not aware that kids can get these and abuse them, and therefore they are easily accessible.
- The younger a person is when they start using, the more likely they will abuse.
- Products are targeted towards our youth especially tobacco products.
- Marijuana is a growing problem due to the social acceptability and the much higher potency than back in the 70's.
- There is no regulation on many products and kids can easily access them in smoke shops and gas stations.

Vicky reminded us that we need to be aware of the products our kids may be accessing, and to educate them that these things are harmful to their bodies and how. She also pointed out that many parents have no idea that these products even exist. Kids can be using drugs right in front of their parents (such as the alcohol-infused whipped cream) and the parents do not even realize it. Kids are also taking products to school because many mimic regular products (powdered alcohol in a water bottle looks like a bottle of water infused with any common powder like a "Crystal-Lite" packet). Many e-cigarettes look like a pen and school personnel are not even aware that they are actually holding a product that is not allowed on school property.

In summary, be aware of the many temptations and easy access kids have to drugs. Stay on top of the types of products that are being sold in your community. Be watchful of the things kids are talking about and educate parents about the dangers of so many of the products being sold that are not regulated. NWMSCA was very glad to have such a fantastic speaker who truly opened our eyes to the sad truth about the drug trends of today.
