Normally I would have quietly celebrated to myself in the classroom and then proudly to my huddle of colleagues as we sat eating our lunches in hurried gulps, the stories coming as breaths of air to a swimmer. But this was not a victory on my part, a behavioral modification moment to be savored. He was quiet for all the wrong reasons and somehow I just could not take any joy in that.

As I kept him after class to ask what was the matter – why the change? – it became quite clear to me that this was more than "my dog died" or "girlfriend broke up with me" situation, not that in itself those things wouldn't be equally devastating to some

The information came slowly as he recounted the friend that had been in the car wreck, the hurried dash to the hospital, the nights spent by his side believing in recovery. I tried my best to put on the band aids: You're such a good friend, sounds like he's pulling through, I'm sure he'll be fine... But that wasn't the problem and while



I'm sure the math teacher was checking the tardies with every tick of the clock, I asked him to sit and did more than to hear the sound of his voice – I listened.

In opening up he recounted how his other friends had inquired as to where he had been spending his time and offered their unsolicited advice on how he was wasting it on someone whose future looked so grim. And then the tears started to fall as when he asked them if he were in the same situation would they come visit him? The answer, in one word, "no". He was hurt and scared. The people he had come to know and trust, the ones who had his back and encouraged his usual aggravating behavior had taken it all away in a single moment. My broken heart berated itself for wanting to take joy in his newfound classroom modesty just moments ago. I asked him why he hadn't talked to someone before now – his parents, a coach, the counselor? He looked right at me and said, "Because you are the only one I can talk to."

Have you ever had one of those moments where everything in your life suddenly collides into a spot of clarity? All of the things you took as mistakes, accidents, strokes of luck, and even carefully planned decisions melt into understanding. It happened for me then as I understood without a doubt that everything that I had encountered was setting me on this path to be a school counselor.

As I head back to school for another year of adventure, I am energized and renewed by the thought of what has brought me to where I am today. It is my hope that the same is true for you and as you start the 2012-13 school year, you are reminded of and re-energized by the memory of what put you on the path to being a school counselor. Have a great year as a school counselor – you're already on the path for that!

There are 5 teams: Team A serves Atchison, Nodaway, and Worth counties; Team B serves Holt, Andrew, Gentry, and DeKalb counties; Team C serves Buchanan, Clinton, Platte, and Clay counties; Team D serves Harrison, Mercer, and Grundy counties; and Team E serves Daviess, Livingston, Caldwell, and Ray counties. If you have served in the past on any of these teams, you should have received an e-mail from Karen asking if you will be serving again this year. We do have some schools in our area that have only one counselor, so it is extremely helpful when the need arises to have that additional support and resource available. Technology in today's classroom is essential to reach our students. Students can do more with their phones and computers than some of us can even dream of. Here are a few ideas that I have found that work great in and out of the classroom.



Check out apps for smart phones and ipads. Some universities have come out with apps that can provide virtual tours of their campus, maps of the university, calendar of events, a directory, and even register for classes. During my last search, I found apps offered by University of Missouri, University of Central Missouri, Missouri State, Columbia College, University of Nebraska, and University of Kansas. I'm sure even more will be coming out in the near future. There are even apps that can help students research different requirements for universities and colleges they may be interested in. The College FAFSA Finder provides students with the tuition, fee, room and board cost, main address, admission office address, contact information, website address, and the federal school code.
